Explore the wild with our Conservation Programme in Botswana!


Through volunteering, you'll help us preserve the ecological well-being of the area and ensure the survival of precious wildlife species.

Projects Abroad have also adopted these goals, with each project having different aims.



Day 1

Welcome!

On arrival day, a Projects Abroad staff member will be waiting to collect your group from the northern Johannesburg Airport (JNB). Our staff members are easy to spot because they're by the airport exit holding a sign.

You will then be taken by minibus to your accommodation at the Tuli Wildlife Reserve. This is a four-hour drive, but a great chance for everyone to observe the scenery and let it sink in that you're in Botswana!

You'll then have the rest of the day to unpack and settle into your new home for the next 10 days!

Day 2

Inductions

After your group has taken a moment to settle in, you are all given culture awareness training. This is designed to give volunteers insight into the country's culture, customs, and traditions.

There will also be orientations to help you feel more at ease during your time in Botswana. Staff will show you around the reserve and the facilities. You will also meet the expert conservationists you'll be working with and learning from during your project. This is a great opportunity to find out more about the aims of the work taking place here, find out about your work schedule, and ask any questions you may have!

In the evening, your group will enjoy a traditional meal before getting some well-earned rest!

Days 3-7

Conservation

With support from expert conservationists, you will learn a range of skills and complete tasks such as:

- Tracking animals during surveys and helping gather research data
- Removing wires and snares and participating in anti-poaching patrols
- Setting up camera traps
- Surveying baobab trees
- Studying animal behaviour
- Building waterholes and dams to create vital water access for wildlife

The tasks your group take part in will depend on the needs of the wildlife reserve at the time of the trip, but there will always be plenty for everyone to get involved with.

While here, you'll get to see a variety of wildlife, including elephants, leopards, giraffes, rhinos and hippos!

Evening

Spend a night around the campfire together. Toast marshmallows, share stories, and sing songs beneath the shade of an acacia tree. This is the perfect way to start the trip of a lifetime!

Days 8-9

Weekend trip

Solomon's Wall - 1.5 hour drive

Today, you'll begin to learn more about Botswana with a trip to Solomon's Wall. A natural phenomenon, this 30-metre-high basalt rock used to act as a natural dam across the Motloutse River, with waterfalls spilling over the top.

Over the years, semi-precious stones have been found along the Motloutse riverbed. You will also notice tall fever trees lining what would have been a natural beach.

Rhino Reserve & Swimming - 1 hour drive

Step out into the Limpopo-Lipadi Reserve and join the anti-poaching squad as they track each and every rhino. Identify tracks of individual rhinos and follow until you find these magnificent creatures.

In the afternoon, cool down with a swim in the river before heading back to the Tuli Reserve.

Evening, day 8

It's the final night at the reserve! Celebrate your time here as a group by making a traditional feast. Take photos, make memories, and watch the sunset.

Botswana Fact Sheet


